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Ce Assessments Suite Implemented October 1 in New York State

On Oct. 1, OPCA implemented the Ce Assessments Suite to make various screening and assessment instruments available to all probation departments and officers in New York. The MAYSI-2—Massachusetts Youth Screening Instrument— is now available to be completed electronically in Ce Assessments. The MAYSI-2 or mental health screening is required to be conducted for all youth—PINS and JD's eligible for intake and diversion services. Similarly, the RAPID Instrument which assists probation officers in completing screenings for all PINS and JD youth eligible for Intake and Adjustment services, is required. The RAPID assists in identifying youth who may be subject to sexual exploitation, and in need of services provided through Safe Harbour Programs. Also new, New York City Probation Officers will access the DVSI-R through Ce Assessments to inform supervision of individuals convicted of domestic violence crimes.

DCJS Distributes \$20 Million to Support Pretrial Services in New York State

On Sept. 29, all counties outside of New York City were notified that they would be receiving a portion of the \$20 million in pretrial services funding that was outlined in the Governor's 2022 State of the State policy agenda. This funding was provided to support a continuum of pretrial services, including screening and assessments, supervision, a centralized case management system, and dedicated information sharing with the court system. Probation departments and community-based providers will receive this critical funding to expand and enhance services that enhance public safety and return more people to court. DCJS allocated this funding based on the five-year average of lower court arraignments in each county. In New York City, pretrial services are provided by the Criminal Justice Agency (CJA).



Extreme Risk Protection Orders

On Aug. 24, *Everytown for Gun Safety* presented a webinar for New York's Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice partners regarding New York's Extreme Risk Protection Order (ERPO) law as found in Civil Practice Law & Rules Article 63-A. This webinar, hosted by the DCJS Office of Public Safety, was well attended, with an audience of nearly 800, including many probation professionals. Extreme Risk Protection Orders are *civil matters* and CHRI information cannot be accessed by any agency for such purpose. Further, ERPO Background Investigations as described in CPLR §6342(9) are intended to be completed by police departments as the "law enforcement agency having jurisdiction" pursuant to the statute.

When developing an ERPO petition, police departments must include evidence that an individual is a harm to themselves or others. Police departments will review past police contacts, calls for service, local record managements system, crime analysis centers, etc., to conduct this analysis. Police departments may contact probation departments as part of this analysis.

The Red Flag Law, also known as the Extreme Risk Protection Order law, became effective in New York State on August 24, 2019. The law prevents individuals who show signs of being a threat to themselves or others from purchasing or possessing any kind of firearm. On May 18, 2022, Governor Kathy Hochul signed an Executive Order to require State Police to file for an ERPO whenever they have probable cause to believe that an individual is a threat to themselves or others. Governor Hochul also signed legislation on June 6, 2022, as part of a landmark gun legislation package, on June 6, 2022 Gov. Kathy Hochul signed a law that expanded who may file an ERPO petition to include health care practitioners who have examined an individual within the last six months; amended the firearm licensing statute to ensure mental health practitioners' reports on potentially harmful individuals are considered closely when determining whether to issue a firearm license; required police and district attorneys to file ERPO petitions when they have credible information that an individual is likely to engage in conduct resulting in serious harm; and required State Police and the Municipal Police Training Council to create and disseminate policies and procedures to identify when an ERPO petition may be warranted.

Please be advised that the Municipal Police Training Council, with the support of DCJS, will be convening meetings in the coming months to develop guidance and model policy for police departments regarding ERPO's. The Interstate Commission for Adult Offender Supervision (ICAOS) held its 20th Annual Business Meeting in New York City at the NY Hilton-Midtown, Sept. 26-28. This year's ABM marked the 20th Anniversary of the adult interstate compact, and this meeting was the most attended ABM in the Commission's history. The Commission is comprised of representatives from all 50 states and 3 federal territories, who gather each year to vote on various interstate rules and discuss topics and trends that affect the interstate transfer of individuals on community supervision. On Tuesday, Sept. 27, the agenda included several topics including "Lessons Learned: COVID," "The Changing Landscape of Substance Abuse and its Impact on Supervision" and a very impactful panel titled "Past, Present, Future: Engaging Victims." The Tuesday session ended with the viewing of the Commissions recent documentary called "The Road Home." which followed the lives of individuals who had transferred their supervision from one state to another. On Wednesday, Sept. 28, the Commission reviewed a University of Cincinnati Corrections Institute Compact Study to assess how states are meeting the mission of the Compact and how it can meet its future goals. The Commission also reviewed and approved an increase in annual dues—the first in nearly 10 years. NYS Compact Administrator Robert Maccarone delivered the keynote address on the day of the Annual Business Meeting, Sept. 28.

Informational Exchange and Panel Discussion: "The Role of Criminal Justice Advisory Boards in Criminal Justice Planning, Coordination, and Implementation."

On Aug. 25, OPCA hosted an Informational Exchange and panel discussion titled "The Role of Criminal Justice Advisory Boards in Criminal Justice Planning, Coordination, and Implementation." Panelists from Dutchess, Niagara, and Westchester Counties joined OPCA staff for a wide-ranging, informative, and enthusiastic conversation about the role of Criminal Justice Advisory Boards in community program settings. While certain regulatory requirements are shared by the Boards, OPCA learned that each shapes its focus based on the needs of a particular program or jurisdiction. In one location, the Advisory Board is a means of promoting transparency, using its meeting time to review outcome data with its stakeholders. Another Board has found success in assigning specialized projects to one of its subcommittees, allowing a more immediate and stricter focus on planning and implementation. Although Advisory Board meeting schedules and formats have been affected by the challenges of recent years it has also highlighted their importance in the support they provide. OPCA Supports 2022 NYS Probation Officer Association Annual Conference in Syracuse, New York

OPCA was pleased to again support the Annual Conference of the NYS Probation Officers Association. More than 175 Probation Directors, Supervisors, and Officers attended the 2022 Annual Conference entitled, "Redefining Resiliency, Remaining Optimistic and Adaptive in Probation Supervision," held July 27-29 in Syracuse, New York. OPCA has continued to support the evidence-based training of probation professionals by providing scholarships for conference registration. State Director Robert Maccarone has described the annual conference as the "premiere training event" for probation officers and a cost-effective means of training significant numbers of probation professionals over a three-day period. This year's conference included nearly 25 workshops on probation practice such as Tactics Training, the Use of Polygraph, Probation Searches, Restorative Practices, and Cognitive-Behavioral Intervention Practices within Probation Practice. OPCA sponsored five workshops and included training on Evidence-Based Probation Practice, Race Equity and Inclusion, Probation Peer Support Teams and Officer Wellness, Sexual Orientation Gender Identity and Expression, and the Importance of Supervision, Mentoring, and Succession Planning in Probation.

On July 28, New York City Department of Probation Officer Joel Figueroa was presented the OPCA 2022 Outstanding Service by a Probation Officer Award at the New York State Probation Officer Association Awards Ceremony. As a member of the NYC Department Probation Team, Probation Officer Figueroa develops programs and events to divert youth from further juvenile justice involvement through the "Every Child has an Opportunity to Excel and Succeed (ECHOES)" Program. This provides youth with opportunities to develop a strong sense of self

and pride to enhance their futures. Probation Officer Figueroa takes his dedication to youth services even further through his guidance of a mentoring group for young men in the Bronx – 'Strong Wise & Achieving Goals' (SWAG) – that promotes accountability, resiliency, and leadership. Through SWAG, he facilitates group and individual mentoring sessions, community outings, and the 'breaking of bread' to create positive peer environments for young people to succeed.

New York City DOP Deputy Commissioner Gineen Gray nominated Probation Officer Joel Figueroa to receive this prestigious award. The DOP's Senior Director of Programs and New Initiatives, Audrey Wilson, was present to support Probation Officer Figueroa and reinforce his commitment and ingenuity. Probation Officer Figueroa's tendency to go above and beyond was also acknowledged, including his development of a positive message notice, which involves leaving uplifting notes at the homes of youth that were not present for a home visit. The Department noticed that Probation Officers received positive feedback from youth on supervision. Director Maccarone encouraged Probation Directors and Officers to institute this practice in their own departments and said, "imitation is the sincerest form of flattery".

Probation Practice Tip

Interstate Practice Tip - ICOTS Profiles

ICOTS Users should create a Transfer Request or Request for Reporting Instructions for an individual placed on probation supervision when they are ready to submit the request(s). Transfer Requests and Requests for Reporting Instructions should not be created in anticipation of a probation sentence or possible transfer. ICOTS Users should submit the request(s) under the individual's existing ICOTS Offender Profile if one exists and should only create a new ICOTS Offender Profile if necessary. ICOTS Offender Profiles must contain the following information:

- the name of the individual requesting interstate transfer; and
- the individual's DOB, Social Security Number (if it exists), Race, Sex, FBI Number and a photograph (clear, color, cropped photo).

Probation Officer Wellness and Peer Support Program Updates

On Aug. 23, OPCA partnered with the New York State Office of Mental Health to deliver the Officer Wellness for Probation Professionals training. We are pleased to report 146 probation professionals attended this four-hour training. In September of 2022, OPCA concluded Phase II of Peer Support Team Training when it hosted the International Critical Incident Foundation (ICISF) 14-hr Group Crisis Intervention training at the New York State Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services. Presently, there are 81 trained Peer Support Team Specialists and 21 Peer Support Team Programs across New York State. In an effort to assist our peer support team members, OPCA has created the PST ListServ and PST Quarterly Call. The PST ListServ has been active since June 2021 and the Quarterly Calls were initiated in April of 2021. Both tools afford opportunities where Peer Specialists can discuss implementation plans, share policies/resources and offer mutual support to other trained specialists throughout the state. No confidential information is shared. The next Quarterly Call took place on Oct 19. Peaceprints of WNY Awarded Federal Investment to Provide Services to Justice-Involved Youth

On Oct. 3, Peaceprints of WNY was awarded \$750,000 to work with justice-involved young people ages 14 to 18. Over the course of three years, this program will connect 100 individuals with a case manager during their incarceration at the Erie County Youth Detention Center and up to a year after their release. This program, Empower Youth, is currently funded by the Peter & Elizabeth Tower Foundation and this additional investment will expand the number of people who are served. Legislation

On July 20, Governor Kathy Hochul signed <u>eight pieces of legislation</u> to provide support and resources for victims of human trafficking. These new laws will ensure locations such as airports, bus terminals, hotels and truck stops prominently feature information on human trafficking. This will inform employees and visitors of crucial information about the horrible practice of human trafficking, as well as provide discreet ways for victims to learn their rights and available resources.

On Aug. 8, Governor Kathy Hochul signed a <u>package of legislation</u> to promote fairness and restore dignity for justice-involved individuals. The first piece of legislation will allow individuals under community supervision to attend required programming such as substance abuse treatment during nonworking hours to avoid any conflicts with their own work schedule. The legislation allows individuals to prioritize both employment and treatment. The second piece of legislation aims to correct outdated terminology in state law. Moving forward, the word "inmate" will be replaced with "incarcerated individual" to further reduce the stigma against people involved in the criminal justice system. Previous legislation covered all instances of state law but did not cover active pieces of legislation in 2021 that were signed into law and included the term "inmate."

On Aug. 9, Governor Kathy Hochul signed legislation that will increase public awareness on job opportunities in New York State. Legislation (A.8458A/S.6803A) will authorize the New York State Department of Labor to develop a public awareness campaign that will promote the New York State Job Bank. The New York State Job Bank is an online resource maintained by the NYSDOL to connect job seekers with over 250,000 jobs across all industries.

On Aug. 9, Governor Kathy Hochul signed legislation (S.687/A.3998) to strengthen restrictions on imitation weapons, which can be used to commit crimes. The new law makes imitation weapons easily identifiable, preventing them from being used to commit crimes and allowing law enforcement to identify a device as fake when assessing threats.

On Aug. 10, Governor Kathy Hochul signed legislation (S.5933-A/A.8133) that will direct the Department of Labor to conduct a study on the statewide employment rate of trans individuals in the State, in consultation with the Division of Human Rights. This study will be used to determine whether there is a disparity of employment rates between transgender New Yorkers and other residents in New York State.

Executive Law Update - Essential Personal Property (EPP)

On Oct. 13, Governor Kathy Hochul <u>announced</u> that victims and survivors of crime whose essential personal property was stolen, damaged or destroyed during the incident, may now receive up to \$2,500 to replace items deemed necessary for their health, safety or welfare. Prior to this change, state law capped the reimbursement rate at \$500, an amount that failed to keep pace with inflation and cost-of-living increases. This financial assistance is administered by the State Office of Victim Services, which provides a critical safety net for victims and survivors who may not have the resources to pay for expenses resulting from crime.
